1. Student experience

• online survey with questions on:

- basic demographic characteristics and faculty
- ✓ where respondents came from
- where and how often they met students from other cultures
- involvement in university club and societies
- their intercultural experience at the University of Southampton

459 usable responses

• online survey key findings:

✓ two-thirds of students rate their intercultural experience while at Southampton as positive

- UK students mix with students from other cultures less than non-UK students
- Winchester School of Arts and the Health Sciences students appear to make the fewest intercultural connections



double-edged sword


English as a lingua franca

2. Perceptions of an intercultural/global university:

equal opportunities where no one is left out

foster links between different cultures without losing specific identities

individual efforts to connect

recommendations:

- ✓ optional module on studying at the UoS
- ✓ optional module on raising cultural awareness
- discussion groups during induction or Freshers week
- ✓ publicity of societies during re-Freshers
- having a study-buddy within your course
- teachers to encourage more group work/student interaction
- social activities within the faculty throughout the semester
- ✓ better communication between faculties
